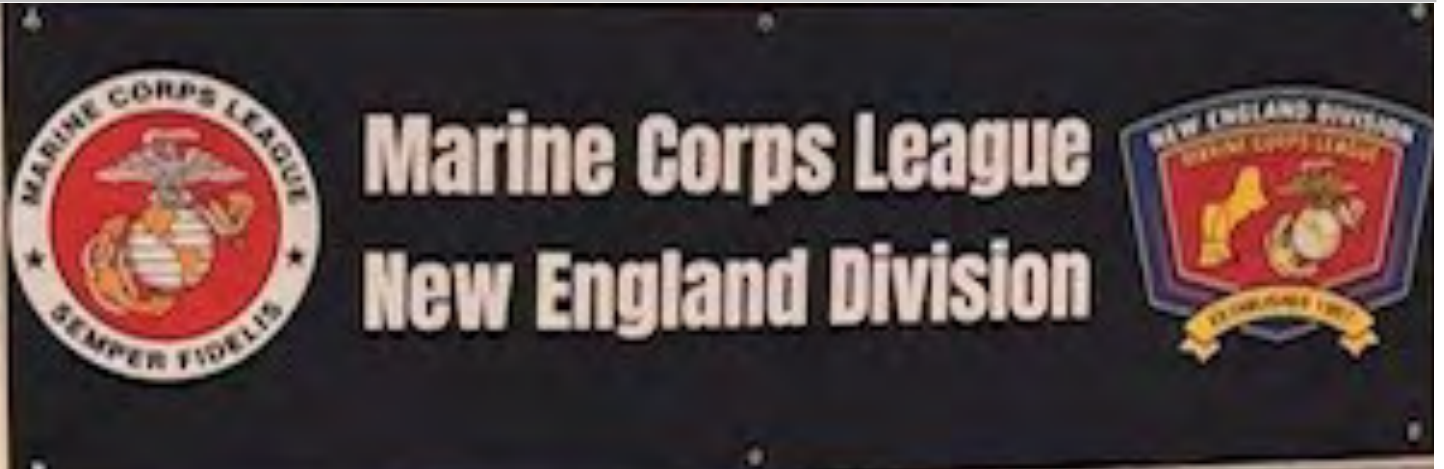

Hello to all of our Marine Corps League members and their families. I wanted to let you know about a newer committee that was the creation of Past National Commandant Warren Griffin. Last year Warren wanted to do more for our Marines pertaining to their mental health and wellness. This is how HAMSAL was created. HAMSAL, which stands for “Help A Marine, Save A Life”, centers around taking care of yourself, as well as taking care of each other.

Last year I attended many Division Conferences upon request and presented a PowerPoint that included a little bit about my story, Question, Persuade, Refer (QPR), mental health and substance use disorder. QPR covers suicide awareness and prevention, and I know that we do not talk about this enough. What’s that you say, you don’t like talking about these uncomfortable topics? Well, I am here to tell you that those days are gone. We are our brothers and sisters keeper, whether you know or it like it. We cannot do this alone so we will do this together.

I was honored to speak at the New England/Quad States Conference and if you missed it, you are in luck. I am available to present to your Department and your membership to help spread the word. My HAMSAL presentation can also be found on the MCL Library under the member section. As a retired Police Officer and Marine Corps veteran in recovery, I understand about suffering in silence and fighting that stigma, especially within the First Responder and military/veteran community. FLAG DAY

Flag Day is Saturday, June 14, 2025. Flag Day is a celebration of the American flag that occurs each year on June 14, the anniversary of the flag's official adoption.

What we know fondly as the "Stars and Stripes" was adopted by the Continental Congress as the official American flag on June 14, 1777, during the Revolutionary War. Colonial troops fought under many different flags with various symbols—rattlesnakes, pine trees, and eagles—and slogans—"Don't Tread on Me," "Liberty or Death," and "Conquer or Die," to name a few.

The Declaration of Independence made the adoption of an American flag necessary. Previously, each colony or special interest had its own flag. On that 14th of June, Congress made the Flag Resolution of 1777, stating: "The flag of the United States shall be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white, with a union of thirteen stars of white on a blue field ..." Official announcement of the new flag was not made until Sept. 3, 1777.

The Continental Congress left no record as to why it chose these colors. However, in 1782, the Congress of the Articles of Confederation chose the colors for the Great Seal of the United States with these meanings: white for purity and innocence, red for valor and hardiness, and blue for vigilance, perseverance, and justice. Today, some people claim the Flag to be divisive, and to those I ask, show me how. The original design took the thirteen colonies and represented them by 13 stars in a circle for unity. As we grew as a nation we added a star to the Flag to perpetuate Unity. For over 250 years people have gathered round that flag and carried it into every battle we fought. Those that fought in those battles and died had one thing in common they were American, there was no other designation. Those who have lost someone in one of those wars will have a Flag in a case to represent their loved ones service, were these people wrong? The Flag today still has thirteen stripes to represent where we came from. We have 50 stars to represent the 50 states. No star is bigger than another nor does it claim any more space than the others. All the stars today represent a state, not an individual, not a race, not a religion. For over 250 years we have grown and advanced as a society, maybe not as fast as you would like but we keep moving forward. The Flag today is made up of the same principals and values as we started out with. The current American flag was designed by a high school student from Lancaster, Ohio, named Bob G. Heft! Even though Bob's history teacher gave him a "B-" for not knowing how many states the Union had, Bob submitted his design to the White House (unprompted) in anticipation of Hawaii and Alaska joining the Union.

I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all.

WHAT'S WRONG WITH THIS PICTURE?



This t-shirt was designed locally and sold to members of a Connecticut Detachment. The problem is that the Eagle, Globe, and Anchor is

copyrighted by the U.S. Marine Corps. The Corps is using this modernized EGA currently and has not authorized the Marine Corps League to use it. The emblem requires authorization from the USMC which allows only licensed vendors to use it.

Every part of the EGA, in all cases, are registered trademarks of the USMC. Even in our League logo, the only word that is not a USMC trademark is "League". That being said, the USMC has given its permission to the MCL to use all versions of the EGA except the one pictured above with the splits in the wings.

REPRINTED FROM OUR MARCH NEWSLETTER:

From the 2025 Mid-Winter Conference. VSOs and other nonprofit military organizations must prove that their membership consists of 80-90% veterans in order to maintain their 501(c) status. Fortunately, the MCL is exempt from this requirement, at least for the time being, because we are the only VSO chartered by Congress.

In order to be prepared, National is requiring that all Detachment rosters precede members' Profile IDs with a "V" in the Atlas system. Regular members, Marines, are easy to identify and mark appropriately. Associate members are a different story. Associate members may or may not have served in the military. To identify those who have, Detachment Commandants must mark-up their associates on their Atlas rosters and send them to me electronically. I will track them and forward them to National.

If you need an updated roster, let me or Walt Benson know. We can send you a new one but if there have been no changes within the last few months, the ones I sent out earlier should be adequate.

To date, I have only received this information from one Detachment. Please get this information to me ASAP. If your Detachment has no non-veteran members, please send me a negative report. In any case, please CC Department Senior Vice Commandant Walt Benson.

The Marine Corps League Foundation, a nonprofit agency, provides important financial assistance to Marines and their families, as well as other charitable causes. National is recommending that all Detachments donate to the MCLF annually.

CONNECTICUT RECOGNIZES WORLD WAR II VETERANS

On Monday, May 19 th , State leaders from Connecticut and representatives of the French and British governments honored 70 Connecticut WWII veterans at the State Armory in Hartford. The WWII veterans ranged in age from 97 to 105. The audience consisted of the WWII veterans and their families. Some were in wheelchairs and behind walkers, but some still were walking without help but all were proud to be there. They wore ballcaps emblazoned with their branches of service and their units and ships. They had stories to tell from the



Pacific and European theaters and from state-side service. James Morgia, 102, of Stratford, was wearing his original Army greens with captain bars on the shoulders and Silver and Bronze Star medals on his chest.

He was with the 84th Infantry Division at the Battle of the Bulge. He talked about saving the town of Beho in Belgium with a called-in artillery strike on German tanks. A microphone was passed to veterans who wanted to speak and when it came his turn, Morgia bellowed, "I won the Battle of the Bulge"!

One Marine veteran, Joe Caminiti, a member of the Hardware City Detachment served on Iwo Jima, a ferocious battle that claimed 25,000 U.S. casualties, including about 7,000 killed.

"They endured hardship that tested their spirits and their will, yet they never faltered" ; Maj. Gen.

Francis J. Evon Jr., adjutant general of the Connecticut National Guard, said. Representatives of the United Kingdom and France also thanked the Connecticut veterans on behalf of their governments and citizens. David Clay, the British Consul General in Boston, said American soldiers helped win the longest peace that Europe has known. French Deputy Consul General in New York, Myriam Gil, said her nation will be forever thankful to U.S. soldiers for freeing France from Nazi tyranny. She said, "I cannot overstate our gratitude".

At the end of the ceremony, Bysiewicz pinned a World War II victory medal on each veteran, along with

an official statement of recognition and thanks. "As a member of our Greatest

Generation", the statement said, "it is because of your bravery and dedication to serve in the United States Armed Forces that all Americans are able to live in a free and democratic Nation Today".

The French Deputy Consul General also gave a certificate to each veteran that said, "On the 80th anniversary of the armistice of World War II, France extends its deepest gratitude to the American soldiers from Connecticut who fought alongside France and its allies, to their families and the families of those who fell in the name of freedom".

MEMORIAL DAY CEREMONY AT THE IWO JIMA MEMORIAL IN CT

Jamie DePaola, USMC veteran, was the keynote speaker for the Memorial Day Ceremony at the Iwo Jima Memorial in New Britain. She opened her comments by reminding us that it is our responsibility to be part of Memorial Day ceremonies to remember our fallen, to say their names, and to embrace the loved ones they left behind. When we say, "We've got your six," that includes their families. These Gold Star families are now our families.

This is a milestone year as we celebrate the 80th anniversary of the 36-day battle on Iwo Jima and the end of WWII. Jamie shared that the men who raised the flag 80 years ago did not only inspire the men on the beaches below and the ships in the harbor, but this one flag became a symbol of American victory and perseverance around the world. One flag made a difference that day. It was the one flag that represented "home, patriotism, and liberty" that fueled our fighting force with a muscle and a fortitude that the enemy was not prepared for.

Members of the Marine Corps League, Hardware City Detachment, showed up in force to provide the 21-gun salute and Taps. The program was organized and led by the Iwo Jima Historical Foundation with Elaine Schieffer and Raymond Carrier as the Masters of Ceremony. Pastor Kristian Rosado from the House of Prayer in New Britain offered the Invocation and Benediction. Navy SEEBEES, Charles Ketz, spoke about the SEEBEES direct involvement and impact in the Battle of Iwo Jima and how they are working on being recognized by the Dept. of Defense for their efforts. Elaine Schieffer is hoping to have a new monument built on the grounds to honor and remember the SEEBEES who fought in the Battle of Iwo Jima. 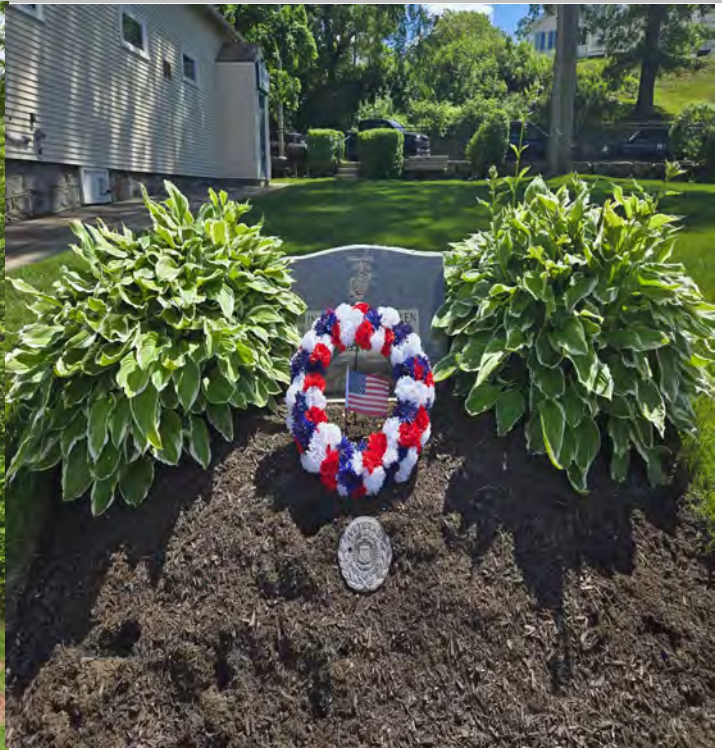

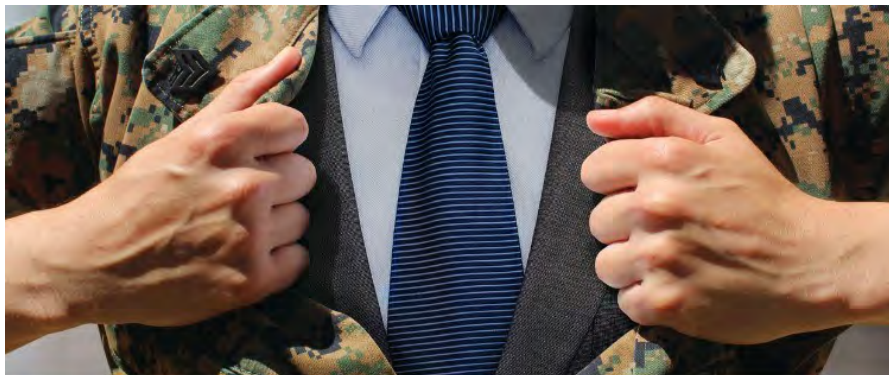

WOUNDED WARRIOR REGIMENT

WWR Fact Sheet

District Injured Support Coordinators & Field Support Representatives

District Injured Support Coordinators (DISCs) and Field Support Representatives (FSRs) are an integral part of the Wounded Warrior Regiment's (WWR) support structure. They act as a conduit to Marine Corps, Veterans Affairs (VA), and civilian resources for Marines recovering away from a military installation or transitioning to veteran status. DISCs are Marine reservists and FSRs are contract support geographically dispersed to provide assistance and community liaison where needed.

The goal of DISCs and FSRs is to return well adjusted wounded, ill, or injured (WII) Marine veterans to their communities with the knowledge and skills to self-advocate and assist other WII Marines.

What Services do DISCs and FSRs offer?

- Outreach through calls or face-to-face contact with WII Marines and their families requiring assistance.
- Assistance with accessing VA and community resources.
- Facilitate veteran medical care through VA patient advocates or OIF/OEF Coordinators.
- Information on family and caregiver support services (i.e. respite care, scholarship opportunities, counseling support).
- Access to education and employment resources in their local communities (i.e. resume development, interview skills, network/employment opportunities, and application completion).
- Support in working with representatives from medical facilities, the VA, legal authorities, businesses, and non-profit organizations.
- Immediate access to the WWR's medical section and VA for psychological health resources and support, including referrals to local resources to ensure WII Marines receive timely and appropriate care.

Who They Support

- Marines transitioning to veteran status
- Reserve Marines
- Marines recovering in remote locations away from military or federal resources
- TDRL/PDRL Marines

Where They are Located

DISCs and FSRs are geographically dispersed across the country and are generally collocated with VA-operated medical centers, vet centers, and outpatient clinics offering primary and specialized care.

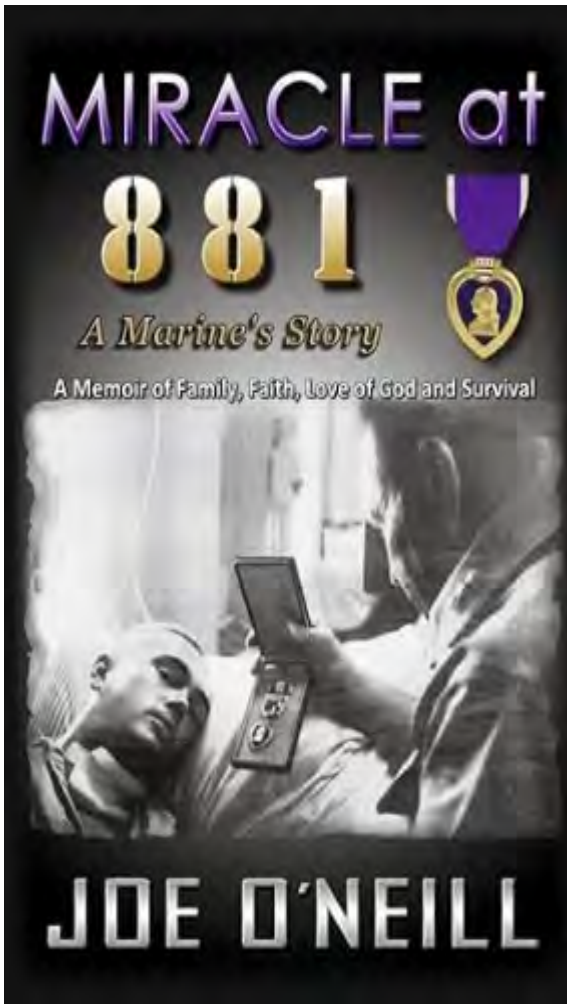

The Miracle

A Miracle happened on April 30, 1967, during a fierce firefight on Hill 881 South in the far northwest corner of South Vietnam.

It was mid-afternoon, around three o'clock. In Marine jargon that's 1500 hours exactly. My Platoon Sargent yelled out! "We need to get one more body and we're out of here!" Marines abhor leaving their dead behind. Then Sergeant Furey called out again in an even louder voice. "I need two volunteers!" His voice echoed across the embattled hill. I, Lance Corporal Joe O'Neill, and Private First Class Les Wyeth volunteered to go up and get the body of that fallen Marine. This was our brother, we would not leave him behind.

A wall of cover fire was laid down for us as we ran up into the woods as fast as our legs would take us. When the dead Marine came into our sight enemy rounds started snapping all around us. The battlefield was as hot as the mid-day sun pressing down on us. I wasn't afraid, I had carried a dead Marine before.

We stopped abruptly when we reached him. He was on his stomach, facing downhill. His sleeves were rolled up and his outstretched forearms were big and caked with dry red clay. I saw his helmet, not his face. There were no blood wounds that I could see. I grabbed his left arm and Wyeth his right. I could feel that rigor mortis had set in. 'He must have been one of the missing from Bravo Company,' I thought.
